



Re: Sacramento Municipal Utility District Comments on the City of Sacramento Waste to Energy Project Concept Approval (February 26, 2008 Agenda, Item No. 27)

My name is Jim Shetler, Assistant General Manager, Energy Supply for the Sacramento Municipal Utility District (SMUD). SMUD appreciates the opportunity to address the City Council and City staff regarding Item No. 27 on today's agenda, the waste to energy project concept. I am also providing my comments in a written format for the record.

SMUD staff strongly supports the City's goal to divert Municipal Solid Waste (MSW) from landfill and to cleanly convert MSW to useful products including green electricity and building products. The City's recent adoption of a Sustainability Master Plan is a positive step toward improved environmental and community health in the region. We also applaud your interest in developing new sources of renewable energy that will help us reduce the region's dependence on fossil fuel for its electricity generation, reduce green house gas emissions and allow us to "harvest" the many valuable resources that we currently throw away. SMUD looks forward to working with the City to achieve these important community goals.

It is a difficult and complex process to select an advanced technology 'Winner' for MSW conversion. SMUD has extensive experience and demonstrated leadership in the development and procurement of "Green" electricity generation. However, we have also made mistakes in selecting new, emerging technologies that have not performed as expected or have not met cost expectations. This is the very nature and risk associated with emerging technologies. At present, there are many MSW conversion technologies in

various states of technology maturity. Particularly for MSW to Renewable Energy, SMUD staff believes that it requires considerable expertise and analysis to select the best available technology for the Sacramento region. Selecting the right technology is crucial. The right technology will not only divert MSW from landfill but also provide air quality benefits, carbon emission reductions and renewable energy to the community.

As you may know, SMUD has a goal of meeting 23% of the region's electricity demand through renewable clean energy resources by 2011. We are well on our way to achieving this goal and we believe MSW conversion has a role to play in meeting that goal. SMUD staff has evaluated several different MSW conversion technologies over the past several years. We released an Emerging Renewable Energy Solicitation last May and we received three technology proposals to convert the City's waste which is currently contracted to BLT into renewable energy. Under the proposals, SMUD would purchase the electricity for the purpose of supplying additional renewable energy to the community. After a detailed technical evaluation and interview process, one of the MSW proposals was selected as a finalist, a waste gasification proposal from World Waste Technologies (WWT) with support from the City's Waste Contractor, BLT. Some of the reasons this proposal was a finalist is the BLT support, and that the proposer had good technical experience with both MSW and the proposed gasification technology. However, SMUD required several conditions that would need to be met before a power purchase agreement would be negotiated. One important condition was a letter from the California Energy Commission that the technology would be considered as "Eligible Renewable Energy" under the State's Renewables Portfolio Standard (RPS). It is possible that not all MSW conversion technologies are considered "Renewable Energy" by the State based on the RPS statute. This condition has been met by the WWT proposal to SMUD. I mention all of this because SMUD believes that in evaluating a MSW-to-Green Electricity project an essential component should be whether the technology qualifies under state law as a renewable energy resource. SMUD also believes that the evaluation of these technologies should consider all of the environmental implications, including impacts to air quality and greenhouse gas emissions.

This evening SMUD would like to propose that we partner with the City to jointly evaluate USST's proposal to the City and the World Waste Technologies' proposal to SMUD. As part of this joint effort, SMUD suggests that the review Committee also include experts such as those from the UC Davis State Biomass Collaborative as well as a consultant with expertise in evaluating MSW conversion technologies for other municipalities. We understand City staff has worked with professors from Sacramento State and it may also be appropriate to include them in the review process. We strongly believe that this cooperative effort will result in the selection of the most environmentally beneficial and economically and technically feasible project for the Sacramento community.

With regard to the specific item on the agenda this evening, SMUD staff encourages the City to continue its discussions with USST to better understand the proposal. However, SMUD does recommend that the City Council either defer entering into exclusive negotiations with USST pending the outcome of the joint review of the two projects or alternatively proceed with **non-exclusive** negotiations until the joint analysis is completed. Also SMUD recommends that the City Council include in its resolution the joint review concept I discussed earlier.

Once again, we commend the City for exploring this bold step forward to address our community's waste issues. We look forward to continuing to work with the City to address the community's environmental and energy needs.




