Subject: Community Racial Profiling Commission Quarterly Report
(January – March 2011)

The Community Racial Profiling Commission (CRPC), established in November 2004, continued to fulfill its mission to serve as an advisory body to the City Council regarding bias free policing. This first quarterly report of 2011 describes the activities of the CRPC from January through March 2011.

The Mission of the Community Racial Profiling Commission is to serve as an advisory body of our community regarding bias free policing.

Since the last quarterly update, the Commission held one meeting on February 17, 2011. Below is a summary of that meeting:

Selection of 2011 CRPC Chair

Members voted to re-elect Danette Brown (At Large) as the 2011 Commission Chair.

Review of Proposed Revisions to Ordinance 2004-17 for Submission to the Draft Ordinance Review Committee (DORC)

Senior Deputy City Attorney Lan Wang reviewed the process and timeline of the proposed ordinance change. He described the steps for adoption as follows: review by the Draft Ordinance Review Committee (DORC), appearance before the Law & Legislation Committee, appearance at Council for a Pass for Publication, appearance at Council for adoption. If the process moves quickly with no edits or revisions required, this timeline could be as short as two months. However, variables such as revisions and calendar scheduling for Law & Legislation and City Council could ultimately affect this timeline.

The commissioners reviewed and agreed with the ordinance changes proposed to expand the powers and duties of this commission to include the following revised mission statement, previously approved goals, and name change:

Mission Statement:

“To serve as a community advisory body that provides recommendations regarding racial profiling and bias-based policing; strengthens community and police relations, and improves public trust.”

Previously Approved Goals:

- 1) Engage and educate our affect communities;
- 2) Engage our police department; and
- 3) Provide periodic analysis and interpretation of continuing traffic stop data.

Name Change to:

Community Racial Profiling and Police Relations Commission (CRPPRC).
